Raffle Report



2008 annual budget, and very reluctantly determined that in spite of trimming in areas and accounts where it was deemed feasible, there is no way SOARA will be able to meet its financial obligations in the upcoming fiscal year. We had a very sizeable rent increase for our Santiago Peak repeater site this year. Soon after the expense of the involuntary repeater relocation to a different site on the mountain last summer, our landlord nearly tripled the rent effective January 1, 2007. This was after the dues letters had been sent out, so we had to sustain the increase from our reserves. Those reserves are now depleted, so the only two options are to either abandon the site, or increase SOARA's primary revenue source, our member dues.

Santiago peak is now the most used site in our system, and investigation has determined the higher rent is still below that of most other sites on the

mountain. In this information age, competition for prime sites like Santiago Peak is very fierce, and if we were to abandon it, we could never go back there. Therefore, after much deliberation, the Board unanimously agreed that a dues increase was the better option. Accordingly, effective October 1, 2007 the new dues rate will be \$50.00 for regular memberships, and \$25.00 for additional family members and students. I assure you that this decision was not made lightly, and only after much investigation, consideration of alternatives, and serious discussion. We also have inquired of other local clubs, and we firmly believe that given the 9 repeaters and number of events and activities sponsored by the club, that SOARA still offers much more for your dues dollar than any other area club. We sincerely hope that this increase will not cause hardship for our members.

Ham Radio 101: Rules and Regulations (Continued)

Last month we looked at the Technician and General Class licenses, now we turn to the:

Extra Class License

The extra class license holder is entitled to all of the frequency privileges afforded by the FCC for amateur radio service. It is important to know for the exam which frequencies on which bands are specifically set aside for the extra class license holder. The prospective amateur extra class license holder must know what to do if spurious signals are being transmitted. This is a slightly different way to ask the same question that has been asked in the Technician and General exams.

Who is responsible if messages that violate FCC rules are transmitted via packet radio? The extra class license holder must understand the ITU rules on frequency allocation. Who allocates the frequencies? Who must approve the usage of an amateur radio station on a commercial ship?

An amateur license holder may accept compensation under certain conditions. What are those conditions? What antenna restrictions apply in a canyon or valley and what are the restrictions near an airport?

You must understand and answer questions regarding alien reciprocal licensing. There are several possible questions covering this category, and the prospective extra class license holder should know them all. There are also a number of questions in the pool that cover RACES. The extra class license holder may be asked one or more of these questions.

Another section covered on the extra class exam covers Amateur Satellite Service. The question pool covers the definition of the Amateur Satellite Service, the definition of a space station, what is an earth station and what amateur stations may operate as an earth station. While the above topics are just a few, they reflect the kind of questions asked in the exam. The prospective ham should review all of the topics.

There are a number of questions covering the appointment of a VE and a VEC. You should review who is eligible to be a VE and a VEC. You should know the duties of a VE and a VEC.

There are a variety of other topics that cover such items as National Quiet Zones, repeater control operators, and frequency allocations for satellite repeaters.

While this and last month's articles do not cover all of the part 97 topics, it is intended as an overview to give a list of study topics to the potential licensee, whether a new license holder or a person who is upgrading their license.
