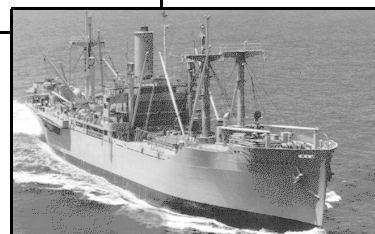

There are two radio rooms with one of them being the ORIGINAL CW (only) station with vintage WWII radio gear and the other an




amateur station. Both stations will be ON THE AIR for operation at sea! The special event call sign will be W6LV and certificates will be provided.

The Way I See It: Field Day Technology

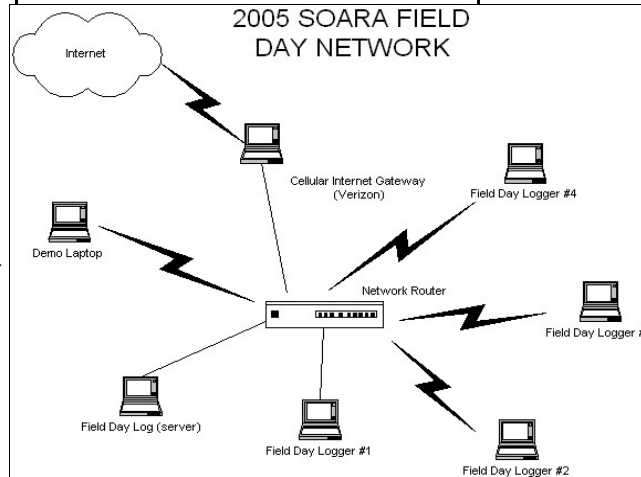
The field day network that is set up every year under the direction of Phil, AD6NH, in the past and now Jeremy, KG6JAD, is typically only used to convey the contacts worked at each radio station to a master logging server. The typical network is comprised of one laptop computer for the primary field day log server and three or four laptops to log contacts as they are made at the various station locations. All of the computers are usually connected together using standard "10/100baseT" twisted pair network cabling.

This year's network had several technological improvements over the previous years networks. First, we introduced 2.4GHz wireless networking capability thus freeing the stations from their wire tethers (other than the inevitable "train transformer"

necessary to power the unit for the 24 hour field day period). This enabled us to have a laptop in the membership area that could keep track of the contacts being made at all of the other stations which we share with visitors, without the need to hover over one of the stations and possibly distract the radio operators.

cellular modem and the engineering ingenuity of the SOARA Field Day Networking Team of Howard, KG6GI, Jerrod, K6TEK, Jeremy KG6JAD, and Brian, NJ6N, (who supervised) we were able to outfit ALL of the field day stations with Internet access.

We didn't end up using the Internet enabled



features of the logging software (the excellent Field Day Network 2.4 program by N3FJP), but we were able to demonstrate our web site to visitors and use the Internet for a variety of tasks including running Satscape to get satellite pass predictions in an effort to achieve bonus points. Perhaps next year we can keep a running tally of our field day contacts on our web site for off-site members to monitor!

The second improvement over last year was the introduction of an Internet connection by way of a Verizon cellular modem courtesy of Howard, KG6GI. With Howard's Verizon

All and all, we had a very impressive field day setup and a top-notch network for sure. ♣

Who that guy that has a partner that's at more club functions then people who actually "belong" to the club?

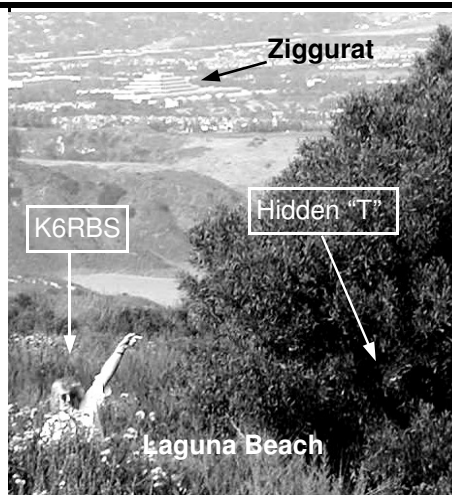
I'd a got a picture of him but he found the fox and beat feet to a play! Didn't even hang around for a burger or dog!
