K6HIV, Mission Viejo RACES members, all worked in communications at the Incident Command Post and Base Camp, located in Irvine Regional Park. Dale, KE6ZGR, participated in canyon fire watch, and Dave, KG6QCI, monitored fire activity, and kept as many as possible aware of the fire location and progress. I'm sure others assisted as well.

Now, for what didn't go so well? All emergency communications groups needed more folks. We simply couldn't provide enough properly trained. equipped, and organized hams to meet the needs. November 9 is the last meeting before the party, so find out your spouse's menu selection and bring your money. This year we will be having our party at:

We will be served our choice of minestrone soup or house salad. For the main course you can choose from:

- 1. **Spaghetti** Rigatoni- Fusilli- Mostaccioli- Linguine- pasta served with marinara or meat sauce (available with meatballs or sausage).
- 2. Cheese Ravioli- cheese filled ravioli with marinara or meat sauce.
- 3. **Homemade Lasagna** lasagna noodles layered with meat, ricotta cheese, imported parmesan, mozzarella and fresh herbs, then baked with marinara sauce.
- 4. Homemade Vegetarian Lasagnalasagna noodles layered with spinach, ricotta cheese, imported parmesan, mozzarella and fresh herbs, then baked with marinara sauce.

- 5. **Eggplant Parmigiana** eggplant layered between mozzarella cheese and marinara sauce, then baked. Served with a side of fusilli marinara.
- 6. **Fettuccine Alfredo** fettuccine sautéed with butter, cream, and imported parmesan cheese.
- 7. **Baked Rigatoni** rigatoni noodles baked with parmesan and mozzarella cheese in meat sauce.
- 8. **Homemade Manicotti-** homemade crepes filled with ricotta cheese, parmesan, mozzarella and fresh herbs, then baked in marinara sauce.
- 9. Linguine with White Clam Sauce- sautéed with fresh garlic, chopped clams, and fresh herbs.
- 10. **Chicken Parmigiana** *lightly* breaded chicken breast baked with marinara sauce and mozzarella cheese.
- 11. Chicken Marsala- boneless chicken breast and fresh mushrooms, sautéed in Marsala wine sauce, served with a side of fusilli marinara.

The Future of Ham Radio



The topic of the October meeting was:"The Future of Amateur Radio"

The format was an open discussion ably moderated by Howard Brown, KG6GI.

A lively discussion centered on Emergency communications, attracting young people to amateur radio, increasing the relevance of SOARA, and various other areas.

It is clear that SOARA members have thought seriously about the future of our hobby.

Howard, KG6GI, started the October meeting with an overview of SOARA's uniqueness among local clubs. SOARA has avoided the membership decline which has plagued most of the clubs in the area. "We must be doing something right, but maybe not enough." Several topics were presented for discussion. We started with a look at what SOARA could do to better meet the needs and interests of its members. Vlad, KI6BLP, suggested undertaking expeditions to remote areas. (This was the first suggestion and it was the first to be accomplished.) The idea of an expedition operations during contests seemed to appeal to several members.

Joe, W6BGR, saw reaching out to young hams as a priority. This should involve both individual efforts and a programmatic effort of the club. Two or three volunteers to work on the development and implementation of such a program are needed. Working with the BSA both through the merit badge program and in providing "Service hours" from assisting in communications for civic events was suggested.

Emergency communications came up before long, with most members well aware of its importance to society and to the preservation of our frequencies. SOARA is fortunate to have several members who work in public safety and who have good insight into the needs of public agencies during emergencies. Although the Public safety agencies have good robust communications systems, the rest of society will be in need of communications in the event of a major emergency inci-

dent. Tom, AE6SH, pointed out that society is increasingly dependent on technology and hams generally understand the technology. Amateur radio will be useful after a major incident whereas cell phones may well be unusable.

In a discussion of new ham technologies (digital voice and data) it was pointed out that volunteers are needed who can help club members become proficient at the operation of equipment and systems. Some hams are adapting used commercial digital communications gear for amateur use. Hal, WB6WXO, noted that it is a long standing ham tradition to adapt surplus gear.

In summary, SOARA is doing a lot right, and there is much more that we could be doing. We need to involve more people in the operation of the club. Our education director has started a series of educational workshops that are proving to be very popular. We need to expand that area with some volunteers to be active in mentoring people in digital modes (D-STAR, PSK-31, etc.) and in internet based modes (EchoLink, etc.). We need volunteers to take the lead in reaching out to youth (through the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, as well as programs in the schools). We need to always be on the alert for ways to attract people of all ages to the radio hobby. Dave, KG6QCI, has been very effective in his local community. We need volunteers to be greeters at the club meeting to ensure that visitors realize that they are welcome and wanted. How can you help?
