

With Solar Cycle 24 upon us, Field Day 2011 promises to be an exciting event. Barring any unforeseen disruptions, the improved propagation should allow us to make many more contacts especially on the 20 Meter and the 40 Meter bands during the nighttime.

For those *experienced hams*, all of the bands should be open for contacts using all modes; RTTY, CW, phone, ATV, etc. Please be prepared to log lots of contacts and generate lots of points. As usual, contesting will continue for 24 hours (11am Saturday to 11am Sunday).

Friday, June 24th

Due to the rules for this years Field Day, we will be allowed to start set-up on Friday, 12:00 noon, at Gilleran Park. Antennas, coax, radio stations, etc. should be up by 5:00 with fine tuning and testing between 5:00pm and 9:00pm. We need all the help we can get to build our Field Day "City". The 80 Meter J Pole held in place by a 7 foot helium balloon will be a real challenge.

Saturday, June 25th:

Show up for a coffee and Danish at 8:00 to make final adjustment prior to commencement of the contesting at 11:00am. Then get on the air! We begin making contacts at 11:00am. Field Day continues throughout the night. Those that care to may bring a tent and/or sleeping bag to catch some sleep at the park during the night.

Sunday, June 26th

Field Day contacts continue until 11:00am on Sunday morning at which time we stop operating and begin taking down the antennas, radios, tables, etc. and moving them back to the container. Again, we will appreciate all the help we can get with the cables, antennas, radios, etc.

Equipment:

We will have all Yaesu FT-950s with the exception of the GOTA station which will be a Kenwood TS-2000. As for antennas, we will have:

Mono band beams on 20m thru 6m. A tri-bander on a tower for GOTA. A 43' vertical on the batting cage and A sloper for 40m. A dipole and hopefully a J pole for 80M.

Anyone can operate, you don't have to have HF privileges.

DaytonTrek 2011



Although we did not hold a club contest this year the annual migration of club members to the Hamvention in Dayton, Ohio still occurred. For those unfamiliar, Hamvention is the world's largest ham radio convention hosting nearly 25,000 participants for three days. It includes forums, product announcements, flea market and vendors floor. Hams from around the globe come to Dayton to attend.

Brian Roode, NJ6N and myself left Laguna Niguel on Sunday, May 15 and arrived on Wed., May 19. We attended the Contest University at the Crowne Plaza hotel on May 20th. This was eight hours of forums with some of the worlds leading contesters. It was fun meeting the holders of such well-known calls as K3LR, W3LPL, N0AX, K5ZD. We also saw fellow club members & friends: Howard KG6GI, Tom AE6SH, Don KE6BXT, Janet Margelli KL7MF & Gordon West WB6NOA. Brian and I spent a lot of our time networking with DStar folks...To those with DStar radios, don't be afraid. Break them out and start to play!

After a great time in Dayton, on May 22nd, after Brian and I had put in a long day of driving, the weather had started deteriorating so we found a motel in Lebanon, Missouri. Upon entering the motel the lobby was filled with people surrounding the TV. We were told they were watching coverage of a tornado that just wiped out the city of Joplin, about an hour away. We were also told it was heading in our direction. Fortunately it passed us by.

The next day we continued down Interstate 40 and drove through Joplin. Although we only saw a small portion of the devastation, it was terrible. Continuing down the Interstate we got a call from Richard-K6RBS, who was following us on APRS, warning us of a squall line we were headed toward. We were fairly deep into deteriorating weather when we decided not to stop as we were afraid we would be caught in the storm. This native southern Californian saw lightning like never seen before. (What does it mean when there is no time delay between the flash and the thunder?)

We rounded out our trip with a short stop in Kingman, Arizona and had an "eyeball" with Paul Fortune-KF7GYE, one of last years DaytonTrek contest winner. Paul is a regular member of the 40-meter California rescue communications net hosted by Gordon West. Paul was very excited to finally meet us and we had a great, although brief, visit. We had tried for the past three years to meet up with him and this year we finally got it done. 4600 miles later we retuned home on May 25th.

antennas. Richard's used a balloon for the element part of the antenna, and what I thought was the antenna was just the impedance matching section! Spencer built a large 2 element dipole array that was almost too big for the trees! The ladder line was just inches off the ground and the antenna is designed to go down to 40m, I believe. Spencer's antenna ended up winning the day and had the stronger report for K6LLL, but Richard's balloons were the crowd pleaser of the day.
