Good old fashioned letters in the mail are disappearing, phone calls are being relegated to the cell phone or being used by marketers to hawk their wares, and texting has passed talking as a way to communicate. When I finally entered amateur radio after procrastinating for way too many years, using the auto-patch was a marvelous feature that you rarely hear any more. There are still many requests for new repeaters on the VHF and UHF bands every year but if you scan the frequencies like many of us do, you will find very little traffic on any of them. Even the old form of simplex communication is slowly dying out, and yet every one wants their "own"

frequency, think "Gordo" or "Heiko", or every emergency communications organization in the neighborhood.

Lake T-Hunting or a Tale of Two T's

Karl, KF6MDF and Dale, W8RRV had the honor of hiding the T (or should I say Ts) this month, on 3/9/14. It was a warm sunny day, great for T-Hunting. However, we (Sean AJ6B & Mike K6MSM) were only able to hear the T once from our starting position and just barely at that. Certainly, not well enough to get a reliable bearing. But we decided to head North, after a fashion. We ended up going up the 241 and eventually we were able to discern the relative direction of the T with our Doppler setup. We decided to get off at the 261 and head South, but the navigator (aka me), wasn't on top of the exit and we ended up going all the way to the 91. After spending a good 20 minutes or more to get there and back (no U-turns on the toll road!) we finally headed South on the 261. This was all after we had started late, since our usual hunt vehicle was out of commission and we had to figure out how to get the Doppler working properly and calibrate it.

The T was not easy to hear from practically any location on the road and I'm not sure the vertically polarized Doppler and whip antennas were helping matters. We took some bearing and decided that the T was probably hiding in Irvine somewhere. (wasn't it in Irvine last month too?)

However, we kept losing the signal and the time between transmissions seemed very long. At one point, it is believed that the hiders had a technical problem.

We drove through Irvine Valley College and didn't get any useful readings there. It seemed like it had to be close, but it was just so weak. We then drove down University and circled the Turtle Rock

area and manual bearings with our tape measure beams but the T back in the direction of IVC.

Eventually, the hiders seemed to be growing impatient and asked the hunters if any clues were needed. After providing our general area and getting confirmation that we were in the right city (yay), they advised that perhaps we should head North on Jeffrey. I'm not sure that was the best clue, but the Doppler was finally giving more reliable readings at least. After circling around for a while, we deduced that the T was probably hidden around one of the Woodbridge lakes.

Once the signal finally seemed strong enough we headed out on foot to the North lake shore. Our problems from early soon became evident as we were getting very different bearings on every other transmission. After chasing one of the signals, we found a group of hams looking rather amused. We had found them, but not the Ts yet. I set out to find the South T and Sean went to find the North T. T #1 (or was it #2) wasn't too hard to find on foot as it that irrigation box looked like an inviting hiding spot. T #2 was on the other side of the lake and gave some interesting bearings up close, but we found it on top of a post.
