# President's Message, July 2018

# The 11th Essential for Your Daypack

You may be thinking "Eleven?! I thought there were only 10 Essentials. At least when I was a Boy Scout there were only 10". Well, you're right. There were only 10 listed and the list varied a bit for the younger cubs. This is the list for the Boy Scouts:

- A pocket knife (presumably more than just a knife, a Swiss Army knife for example). In order to use a knife in Scouting, you must have your Totin' Chip award.
- A first aid kit. A basic kit for first aid might include adhesive bandages, medical tape, sterile gauze, moleskin, soap, antiseptic, a mouth-barrier device for CPR, scissors and band-aids.
- Extra clothing to match the weather. Multiple layers are superior to a single massive jacket, because layered clothing is adaptable to a wide range of temperatures.
- Rain gear.

- A flashlight.
- Trail food.
- Water Portable water purifiers and water stills may be used to obtain potable water from virtually any source. If a water-source is unavailable the use of a dromedary bag should be considered. Also bring bottled water.
- Matches and/or a firestarter may be used to light fires for heat, or for signalling purposes. (Publicly owned forests in the United States often have lookout stations for forest fires and signal fires.)
- Sun protection may include sunblock, sunglasses, lip balm and a wide-brimmed hat.
- Trail maps and compass.

These are the 10 Essentials you should have in your daypack on extended day hikes. Honestly, if I'm only going to Peter's Canyon for a loop or a quick out and back to Top of the World I'm likely going to shed most of these items except for water and First Aid Kit.

**Item Eleven** should be, you probably guessed correctly already, your programmed HT (Handy Talkie) radio and a spare battery whether it's a local short hike or an extended and more remote hike such as in the San Bernardino or San Gabriel Mountains. Do your homework before you depart so you know what repeaters are in the area and that you will be able to use them if necessary. Add the lightweight local repeater directory to your map bag in case of emergency and the repeater your thought would work doesn't. Also fun to see what repeaters you can reach when you are on a prominent peak or ridge.

On a recent trip to the San Jacinto State Park and Wilderness area, I found myself using my HT for several things. One was that two of the people in my party had become separated and I was able to enlist the help of several other hikers who had their radios to keep an eye open for them. Fortunately they were located and all was well. One of my other hiking partners had taken quite a lead ahead. He is a newly licensed Ham and I was able to loan him another radio so we could keep in touch. Lastly, I was able to make contact on our own club repeater from a high point and get a message to my wife letting her know all was well. By the way, my cell phone was surrounded by civilization on all sides, but cell reception was little to none....mostly none. Cell reception can disappear deep in our own Trabuco Canyon too if you're not high up enough.

If you're a relatively new ham it's important to get as familiar with your radio as possible. No sense in carrying the extra weight if you don't know how to use it in time of need.

It's mid-July and the heat has been cranked up to make it officially feel like summer. Enjoy the outdoors this summer and don't forget to take your 10 Essentials in your daypack when hit the trails and don't forget the 11th Essential....your HT radio. Be safe and have a great summer.
